Dear Resurgence, Both generally and specifically I did not like in any way Resurgence Vol.6, No.1/Undercurrents 10. As a recent subscriber to Resurgence I do not want to receive Undercurrents or else I'd subscribe to that too. I don't mean that's any derogatory comment as I may well purchase Undercurrents too soon. However I also feel the link to be somewhat of a cheat - half and half rather than a full issue of Resurgence. Or was it a covert admission that there's not enough material for a full Resurgence this time? Furthermore, the issue is rather confusing and waffly, striking like neither one nor the other, rather than a good joint issue.

Another fault that is undoubtedly mine

but not helped by the AT oriented Undercurrents section is the complex terminology. Yes, I am stupid, but that doesn't advance me nor you. It does seem that AT is no more simple than straight technology, and Undercurrents certainly isn't the way in. But where is the way into the basics of any technology?

One thing Resurgence and Undercurrents do share though is a distance by price and orientation from mass readership or understanding. How many workers will relate to either? Isn't this just the quality end of a self-indulgent counter-culture, "We're in and you re not"? I've not had Resurgence long, and though it's interesting I certainly don't feel part of it or relate to it and I'm a student/petit bourgeois.

Turning to the reviews — they seemed to talk more about the reviewers thinking than about the books. Fine, but why pretend to review books on that basis? Maureen Brent's side-swipe in Irish Energy: "So full points for the standard Marxist analysis of the status quo..." — full points, very clever. That's Marxism finished — now let's all be anarchist together again. As a Marxist I'm disgusted to see that you can't take Marxism seriously. Only yourselves. Can you explain Sinn Fein's Marxist connections to me and your totally unsupported conclusion about them?
